QUARANTINE TO BE LIFTED THIS SUNDAY

Board Explains Why St. Paul's Could Not be Closed

DISEASE NOW ON WANE HERE

The epidemic of influenza is so distinctly on the wane as shown by the doctors' report of the last two days that the Board of Health has decided to lift all general quarantine on Sunday, Nov. 3, so that church services can be held on that day and schools, movies, etc., can begin on Monday. It must be noted, however, that in some places, as New York, the epidemic still continues and the people of Princeton are urged to see that anyone suffering from influenza is kept out of contact with others. Such sufferers, even from what appears to be a bad cold should remain at home and in a room apart from other members of their families.

The Board wishes to thank the people for their tolerance and patience with the hardships necessary to the quarantine which in some cases involved financial loss and to express regret that in some instances their recommendations were not heeded. The Board has legal powers to enforce its general quarantine in epidemics such as the present with the exception of the Public Schools and the Churches. The Board consulted its lawyer with regard to its legal right to close St. Paul's R. C. Church which held open services last Sunday, although requested and notified not to do so, and found that there was no law at this time which would support them in this action.

In a subsequent issue of this paper the Board will publish a digest of the facts that have been obtained as a result of the epidemic and such conclusions as they have arrived at as a result of them.

A considerable number of patients still remain in the emergency hospital and further deaths have unfortunately occurred there. Two new nurses have been employed and it is hoped that the need for this institution will soon have passed.

ALL CHURCHES TO BE OPEN SUNDAY

Quarantine Lifted by Health Board
