

# QUARANTINE PROBERS WELL PLEASED HERE

## State Troopers Find One Hundred Per Cent. Compliance With Health Orders.

Two members of the State Constabulary on a trip through various sections of the State to learn just how the quarantine of the State Health Department is being complied with, visited this city yesterday and made an inspection trip. The tour was made by Captain Herbert Smith and Trooper Thomas Bittner, of Troop B, from Wyoming, and they reported a rigid and satisfactory compliance with the order in every respect.

Captain Smith visited Mayor A. L. Reichenbach and Health Officer J. Treichler Butz early yesterday morning, and stated that he had found that local business men are complying to the letter and spirit of the quarantine order of Acting Commissioner of Health B. Franklin Royer. He indicated that he had already made a similar report to the authorities at Harrisburg.

Another tour of inspection was started, the mayor and health officer accompanying the State policemen. Every section of the city was covered and no violations of the Royer edict were discovered. A visit was made to the Allentown Hospital, where extensive preparations have been made to handle the situation should the epidemic increase in proportions in this city.

Captain Smith also paid his respects to Lieutenant Colonel Richard Slee at Camp Crane.

Colonel Slee told the visitors of the precautions taken at the camp to prevent an epidemic among the soldiers. Gauze masks are used by men detailed to sweep and clean the barracks, and soldiers are permitted to sit only on one side of the mess tables. There were twenty-four cases reported at Camp Crane Monday and thirteen additional cases had been reported up until noon yesterday.

"The situation is not at all alarming," said Colonel Slee. "We have had eighty reported cases since September 25, but all have been mild cases. Pneumonia developed in but one case."

Forty new cases of influenza were reported to the local department of health until 10 o'clock yesterday morning. Monday there were 62 new cases. The total number of cases reported in this city now reaches 175.

The local health authorities have ruled that the county and city teachers' institute, scheduled for next week, cannot be held because of the quarantine.

The Board of Governors of the Allentown Aerie, No. 110, Fraternal Order of Eagles, met last evening and decided to close the home on North Sixth street during the period of the quarantine. ## INJECTED AGAINST INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC

Over eight hundred employees of the Lehigh and New England R. R., in this vicinity were injected yesterday by Dr. Harry Leibert, of South Bethlehem, against epidemic influenza. Careful records will be kept and it is likely that the practice will become general if satisfactory results are attained.

Most of the doctors in the Lehigh Valley have taken the anti-toxin themselves, so great is their confidence in it and there has not yet been a case reported among the medical fraternity, although they are constantly in contact with it beyond any other class of
