for any single day since the epidemic broke out. This brought the total of cases reported to date to 570, of which many have been discharged. Yesterday 102 cases were reported discharged and on Thursday 103 cases were reported off, making a total of 205 for the two days. There are less than two hundred persons actually

sick at this time with the disease. The decision to close the churches was the big development of the day in the quarantine of the city. Some of the pastors had decided early in the week upon such a step and various arrangements had been made for the conduct of open-air services.

Council furthermore suggested to the owners of department stores that the advertising of special sales be discontinued during the quarantine period in order that there may be no congestion in their stores.

Physicians yesterday were taking a very rosy view of the situation. The number of deaths has really been very small and they attribute it to the fact that people have alarmed at the results in other cities and are taking unusual percautions. They are not trifling with colds and promptly take to bed when threatened and get rest which is one of the best preventatives

Some very sad chapters, in addition to those chronicling deaths, have
