

CAMP CRANE DOCTORS FIGHT DISEASE AT SCRANTON.

Major Alfred J. Brown, of Camp Crane, in command with seven other officers from Camp Crane including Capt. E. F. Daun, Lieut. R. Z. Cops, W. S. Tucker, R. H. Vose, E. G. Steinhouser, E. H. Reed and A. R. Terry arrived in Scranton on Thursday noon to assist in the fight against the influenza epidemic prevailing in Scranton and Lackawanna county. Four of the officers have taken charge of the emergency hospital in Scranton, the other four being distributed throughout the valley. To date 7,000 cases have been reported with 250 deaths. These officers have been detailed by the government to take speedy action in wiping out the disease in order that the man power will not be further curtailed amongst the miners as there is already a decrease in anthracite tonnage.

BETHLEHEM'S STATUS ON THE EPIDEMIC.

Six deaths and 152 new cases was the toll exacted by the Spanish influenza epidemic in Bethlehem during the past twenty-four hours. This brings the total of cases up to 1955. Following is a list of those who have died of the malady:
