Spanish Influenza, or Contagious Pneumonia, is apparently extending rapidly in many sections of the United States, and, according to the Press reports, is particularly virulent in a number of the Army cantonments.

Several cases have developed among recent arrivals in Camp Crane.

To restrict and minimize as far as possible the spread of this contagion within the Command, the Commanding Officer orders and directs that all Officers and men will comply strictly with the instructions set forth in Memos. 1, 2, and 3.

He further directs and orders that until the restrictions are lifted, officers and men do not enter any place of amusement or participate in any public gathering within a building in the City of Allentown or elsewhere; that they avoid mingling in crowds, riding in public conveyances, and reduce to a minimum necessary visits to stores, etc.

The Commanding Officer has no jurisdiction over the families of officers and men living beyond the limits of the Camp, but the same precautions should be observed there.

It is intended that these orders will be strictly complied with by both officers and men, and that they will impress upon the members of their households the necessity of observing these various restrictions.
