

'FLU OFFICE' DOUBLES ITS ACTIVITIES

More Workers Badly Needed as Calls Continue to Come in

The activities at the popular flu office in the south basement room of the Y. M. C. A. building are increasing daily and the staff of workers there, together with their seemingly tireless helpers, are being called upon from every quarters of the city and even from places outside of town.

One hundred and twenty dinners of light foods and broths were served from the diet kitchen yesterday and a few more were taken out last night. Some of the meals were also of a more substantial nature. Twenty-nine homes are on the list for visits from the nurses and workers and the service of the office was practically doubled yesterday.

The working force is now well organized and the new calls that are expected to come in today will be handled promptly.
