ROYER GIVES BAN-LIFTING REGULATIONS

Director Davis Announces
Details for Business to
Be Resumed Today.

LID IS OFF AT NOON

Amusement Places Com-
plete Arrangements for
Reopening Doors.

FEWER GRIP CASES

In conformity with the program announced last week by the State Health Department the influenza ban in the Pittsburgh district will be lifted at noon today. The local theaters and amusement places, which were the principal interests affected by the ban yesterday completed their preparations for opening at that time.

Instructions as to the details of the ban lifting were received by the city administrator yesterday from Dr. B. Franklin Royer, acting Commissioner of Health. In a general way they apply to the entire county with the exception of a few spots like Oakdale and Unity where conditions are still very bad.

Announced by Davis.

In announcing preparations to comply with the instructions, Health Director W. H. Davis said:

Moving picture places and theaters should be rigidly required to cleanse and ventilate; seating space only shall be sold, and crowding and the assembling of large numbers of people over a large period of time be prohibited. Mayor Babcock sent the telegram to the Director of the Department of Public Health with instructions to carry out the provisions of the measure completely and to use any part of the city government required to do so. The regulations made by the Health Department in keeping with the authority from Dr. Royer are as follows:

and ventilation as applied to picture houses and theaters to be applied to all public halls in meetings of a general character held. The attendance at such meetings must not exceed the capacity. There must not be dance halls, poolrooms, billiard rooms or other like places, any crowd permitted, the attendance being limited by the size of the establishment.

Fewer Influenza Cases.

There was a drop of 90 in the number of influenza cases reported to the Pittsburgh Health Department for the 24 hours ending at 4 yesterday afternoon, the number being 133 as compared with 223 the previous day. There was an increase in the number of deaths, the number being 113 as against 81 Thursday. There were 46 deaths from pneumonia, 69 from influenza, pneumonia and four from influenza.

The total number of influenza cases since the beginning of the epidemic is 13,711. There were 24 cases of pneumonia yesterday making a total of 1,765.
