

THIRTY-SEVEN NEW CASES FOUND IN S. F.

Thirty-seven new cases of Spanish influenza were reported in San Francisco yesterday, one from Oakland, and eleven more were discovered aboard a steamer arriving at this port from Balboa. The vessel is under quarantine, and no passengers are being landed. The total number of cases in San Francisco yesterday reached 129, according to the figures of the health office. Four suspected cases were last night under observation.

There are four cases at the French Hospital, and others were reported from 550 Eighteenth avenue, 1391 Turk street, 24 Sacramento street and 1120 Montgomery street. The Oakland case reported was R. C. Emmons, 5465 Birch court.

Nurses were called upon yesterday to volunteer for service in fighting Spanish influenza and were asked to report at once to their own Red Cross chapter or to the Bureau of Nursing, Pacific division, American Red Cross. This bureau yesterday sent out forty nurses and ten aides to Army posts and for civilian relief. Red Cross activity in the emergency is conducted at the request of Surgeon-General Rupert Blue of the Department of Public Health. The Red Cross will supply nurses, pay salaries and expenses and furnish hospital supplies when local authorities are unable to do so promptly.

The United States Public Health Service announced yesterday that while the number of influenza cases have increased there is no present cause for alarm. At Vallejo as a precautionary measure public gatherings have been suspended. Restrictive measures protecting enlisted men at Mare Island navy yard were yesterday extended to civilian workers, who were advised by Captain Harry George, commandant, not to attend theaters, dances or other public gatherings.
