

INFLUENZA STRIKES TWO MORE IN S. F.

Quarantine Measures Promptly
Taken to Stop Spread of Dis-
ease; Patients Sent to Hospital

City Health Officer Dr. William
C. Hassler Confident Epidemic
Will Be Stopped Quickly

Two new cases of Spanish influ-
enza were reported to the Board of
Health yesterday. They are:

CAUSCH, MRS. C., 133 Noe street,
reported by Dr. Ray Morris.

BROCKWAY, GEORGE A., 1024
Franklin street, reported by Dr. A.
S. Tuchler.

This makes three cases in San
Francisco in the past two days. The
patients were removed to the Isola-
tion Hospital, where, it is said, they
are in good condition and in no
danger.

Brockway was taken ill Friday, but
kept on working at the American Can
Company, where he is employed, until
yesterday morning. He then sent for
Dr. Tuchler, who immediately notified
the Health Department of the case.
Mrs. Causch came here recently from
New York, and it is thought likely
she brought the disease with her.

Dr. William C. Hassler, City Health
official, said yesterday that every
precaution possible is being taken to
prevent the spread of the disease, and
it is not thought that the malady will
gain any great headway in this city.

Quarantine still continues at Goat
Island, but no cases are reported
there. The quarantine will prevail
until all danger of an epidemic is
over. At the present time no quar-
antine has been placed on the Mare
Island Navy Yard.
