

# Police Court to Hold Sessions In Open Air

## Judge Sullivan Takes Steps to Cut Down Influenza Epidemic.

Robert Louis Stevenson's monument in Portsmouth Square may serve as a magistrate's bench tomorrow morning.

Police Judge John J. Sullivan announced yesterday that on account of the influenza epidemic he will hold court in the open air on Monday and on days thereafter until the epidemic has been broken.

"Physicians tell us that open air and sunshine is a preventive for the ailment," said Judge Sullivan yesterday. "There seems to be no great reason why several hundred persons should be cooped up together to scatter the germs when we can all go into the open air."

Sullivan directed that a suitable place for the court's bench should be selected as near as possible to the Stevenson monument.

Several other police judges stated that they will either hold open air sessions or else will adjourn court until the scare is over.

### 1,054 AT CAMP LEWIS.

CAMP LEWIS, October 19.—The weekly health report for the week ending Thursday at midnight and issued today shows that in that time there were 1,054 cases of influenza, 234 of pneumonia and thirty deaths, twenty-eight of which were due to pneumonia.
