POLICE COURT IS HELD IN PARK

Judge Sullivan Administers Justice at Stevenson Monument in Portsmouth Square.

Twenty men with chains on their arms and legs stood before the monument of Robert Louis Stevenson in Portsmouth Square yesterday morning.

Those who could read picked out these words engraved on the granite and perhaps some of them tried to remember:

"To be honest, to be kind; to earn a little, to spend a little less; to make upon the whole a family happier for his presence."

All were prisoners, and before them sat in a chair the grim representative of the law which they had violated. That personage was Police Judge John J. Sullivan.

It was the occasion of the first out-of-door Police Court that has ever been held in California. The reason for it all was the prevalence of the influenza epidemic.
